•It contains an independent clause and a dependent clause headed by a subordinating conjunction or a relative pronoun.

Subordinating conjunctions

After, although, as, because,
even though, if, since, though, unless,
until, when, whenever, whereas,
wherever, while

- Although I arrived early to the station, I missed the train.
- Dependent clause, independent clause.
- •I missed the train although I arrived early to the station.
- Independent clause dependent clause.

- Although she completed her literature review, she still needed to work on her methods section.
- Because he organized his sources by theme, it was easier for his readers to follow.

- "It doesn't matter how slowly you go as long as you don't stop." —Confucius
- •While I am a passionate basketball fan, I prefer football.
- •I am extremely happy since I retired.

#### Relative pronouns

Who, whom, whose, which, that, where, when, what, why, whoever, whomever

- Ahmed read the book that he bought from the bookstore.
- •Salma, who is a teacher, also works as a librarian.
- •Sara is the patient whom I visited at the hospital.

### Compound-complex sentence

•It contains two or more independent clauses, and at least one dependent clause.

### Compound-complex sentence

- Although she prefers Tiramisu, she ordered cheesecake, and she thought it was delicious.
- •While waiting for the train, I talked to my friend on phone, and my sister read a book.
- As I put my book in my bag, I look for my smartphone, but it was not there.
