1/ The Parthenon in Athens, Greece

Parthenon, temple that dominates the hill of the Acropolis at Athens. It was built in the mid-5th century BCE and dedicated to the Greek goddess Athena Parthenos ("Athena the Virgin").

The temple is generally considered to be the culmination of the development of the Doric order, the simplest of the three Classical Greek architectural orders.






2/ The Taj Mahal in Agra, India

The mausoleum in Agra is India's most famous monument, and a sublime shrine to eternal love.


Built from between 1632 and 1647 by the Mughal Emperor Shah Jahan, the Taj Mahal was dedicated to Jahan's favorite wife, Mumtaz Mahal, who died during childbirth.

3/ The Sagrada Familia in Barcelona, Spain

Sagrada Família, in full Templo Expiatorio de la Sagrada Família, English Expiatory Temple of the Holy Family, Roman Catholic minor basilica in Barcelona, Spain, designed by Antoni Gaudí. Begun in 1882 and still unfinished in the first quarter of the 21st century, the Sagrada Família, notable for its tactile organic form, is one of Barcelona's most famous landmarks. It is an unexpected sight in its urban setting, with its bold flying buttresses and twisted towers looming over the city.



4/ The Sydney Opera House in Sydney, Australia

The Sydney Opera House is a multi-venue performing arts centre in Sydney. Located on the foreshore of Sydney Harbour, it is widely regarded as one of the world's most famous and distinctive buildings and a masterpiece of 20th-century architecture.

Designed by Danish architect Jørn Utzon, but completed by an Australian architectural team headed by Peter Hall, the building was formally opened by Queen Elizabeth II on 20 October 1973, after a gestation beginning with Utzon's 1957 selection as winner of an international design competition.
